- 71% first-time attendees.

Did the MOLA Latino Health Symposium meet the stated objectives?

• **100%** of participants strongly agreed or agreed that the MOLA objectives were met.



Participants particularly valued the following aspects of the Symposium:

- Identification of systemic issues that the Latino/e/a/x community faces in healthcare.
- Proposed strategies to address these barriers, to pursue health equity through innovations in medicine, collaboration, and education for health professionals.
- The speakers were engaging and focused on indicating the barriers experienced.

Did the NAMS Medical Spanish Summit meet the stated objectives?

 99% of participants strongly agreed or agreed that the Medical Spanish Summit objectives were met.



Participants particularly valued the following aspects of the Medical Spanish Summit.

- An engaging and highly professional program fostering continued education in Medical Spanish.
- Learned how other institutions are integrating medical Spanish opportunities in their curricula and how to implement the program in my institution.
- Enhancing medical Spanish through interdisciplinary collaboration, specifically the new tool to test healthcare providers' aptitude for providing language concordant care for Spanish-speaking patients.
- Standardization of curriculum, integration of mental health, and social justice into the medical Spanish curricula.

At the Latino Health

Symposium/Medical Spanish Summit, I obtained new knowledge which can impact my competence (skills, abilities, or strategies) in my profession or training. 95% of participants strongly agreed or agreed they obtained knowledge that will impact their profession and training.

- Physician Oral Language
 Observation Matrix (POLOM).
- Speak up to inspire others to act. Being a leader/advocate for medical Spanish in my school/community, and working with leaders to push forward efforts to improve Spanish health.

- The importance of intersectionality in caring for individuals with multiple minoritized identities.
- Future Directions in Medical Spanish to apply in our own institutions: Additional knowledge and arguments in cultural issues. Ways of engaging my students in meaningful research. How to interact with medical school deans to implement Spanish into medical school curriculum.

I plan to apply what I learned in a way that will impact my patient care and/or performance.

- Advocating at school to integrate Medical Spanish into the curriculum and offer a more intensive and longitudinal Medical Spanish path.
 Advocating in personal practice, for the betterment of the patients.
- Teaching the need for multilingualism and cultural competence
- Implementing the POLOM and adapting it to the course content. Implementing the information in different settings (Hospitals/ School of Medicine, and undergraduate institutions).
- Implementing a more compassionate and culturally centered approach.
